

Behold, My Servant shall deal prudently; He shall be exalted and extolled and be very high. Just as many were astonished at you, So His visage was marred more than any man, And His form more than the sons of men; So shall He sprinkle many nations. Kings shall shut their mouths at Him; For what had not been told them they shall see, And what they had not heard they shall consider. Who has believed our report? And to whom has the arm of the LORD been revealed? For He shall grow up before Him as a tender plant, And as a root out of dry ground. He has no form or comeliness: And when we see Him. There is no beauty that we should desire Him (Isaiah 52:13-53:1-2).

This is a prophecy concerning the coming Messiah. It was written in the eighth century before the birth of Jesus Christ, the Jewish Messiah; our Lord and Savior. And, before everyone goes running through the stores with plastic money in hand yelling "charge" there are some important things we should consider.

The first thing we should consider is how God used His Holy Spirit to speak through Isaiah to tell mankind that salvation was coming; therefore be prepared. The people in Jesus day were not prepared for such an event as the one that transpired. Jesus looked like an ordinary baby and grew up to look like most Jewish young men. The Jewish leaders were expecting someone more exotic looking. Are you prepared to meet Him?

Secondly, we should consider that Jesus Christ, God's Son, has always been in existence. In John 1:1-2 the Bible says, "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God."

So the first time Jesus presented Himself to mankind as the Messiah was nothing new; He just presented Himself in a different form. Have you met Him?

Consider that this physical baby, the son of Mary, and this Divine Child, the Son of God blended together so well that the religious leaders did not recognize Him for who He really was; their Messiah. Many people still do not recognize Him; do you?

Consider, as Mary watched in awe as her Son performed miracles and the religious leaders and the Roman government hated Him because He challenged their religion and displaced Caesar as God.

Consider what went through Mary's heart and soul when they shouted, "Crucify Him;" And then watch it take place.

Did Mary understand that it had to be done for the salvation of all the lost souls in the world, yours and mine? Maybe, but it was still her firstborn Son. Can you feel her pain? Because Mary was a woman of faith she probably knew the Scriptures quite well. Perhaps Isaiah 53 came to mind as the Holy Spirit brought many more thoughts to mind such as, "Come now, and let us reason together," says the LORD, "Though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they are red like crimson, they shall be as wool. If you are willing and obedient, you shall eat the good of the land; but if you refuse and rebel, you shall be devoured by the sword"; for the mouth of the LORD has spoken (Isaiah 1:18-20).

Mary understood that her Son, Jesus Christ, was the long awaited Messiah that would bring salvation to the souls of all who put their faith in Him; and Mary was first!

The only way the birth of Jesus Christ makes any sense at all is to embrace the whole story; the birth, life, death, resurrection, ascension, and His post resurrection appearances for forty days.

This is the real Christmas story. If you miss these things and many more besides, you are just skimming the surface of the greatest event the world has ever witnessed; read the Bible.

It is my prayer that everyone will have a holy Christmas with Christ in their heart. It is free and will fit anyone.

Meeting was opened with prayer at 12:10pm.

The minutes of the last meeting were reviewed. Sandy made a motion to approve, Gary seconded, approved.

Marilynn will send a thank you card to Partyka's for their generous donation of \$500 for the wagon and donations to the CURE picnic and Harvest Dinner.

Tom will get a Christmas tree.

Ralph and Bev repaired, painted, and rearranged the McQueen Hall closet. Sandy will go through it and see if there is anything that can be discarded.

The Life Ladies donated \$500 to Brad Miller to help with the repairs to the van he uses for the Youth Group. The church will donate \$685.58, the balance of what is owed for repairs. Sandy made a motion to approve, Gary seconded, approved.

Gary agreed to stay on another year as Trustee. A replacement will be needed for John and Tony Callari.

The Annual Meeting will be February 4, 2018.

The Treasurer's Report was reviewed. \$5,000 was moved to the Capital Fund. Interest earned for the month \$1,587. The Endowment fund has earned 13% for the year, no changes are recommended. The Harvest Dinner brought in \$1,258.03. Thank you Sandy for all your hard work! Ralph recommended donating the following amounts to missions: \$200 to Fairport Baptist Home, \$35 for One Great Hour of Sharing, \$25 to America for Christ, \$200 to United Missions, \$25 to World Missions. Gary made a motion to approve, Sandy seconded, mission donations approved. Sandy made a motion to approve the Treasurer's Report, Gary seconded, approved.

Jim Richardson installed the threshold for the new door in McQueen Hall. He will also install magnetic weather stripping.

The Pastoral Committee met. It was agreed that Pastor Jim will give a month notice for vacation and will arrange for replacements. When Pastor Jim is on vacation he will be on call for emergencies. Pastor Jim will provide a summary each month of his pastoral activities. Pastor Jim requested that when he does not attend Trustee Meetings that the meetings start and end with prayer.

Ralph will be taking vacations and visiting friends and family throughout the winter months. He will be here for the Annual Meeting but may not be available for monthly Trustee Meetings.

It was discussed at the Harvest Dinner the need for new air conditioners. The currents ones are too small to cool McQueen Hall. Ralph bought 2 air conditioners. They were paid for with money from the Memorial Fund.

The boiler is leaking and needs repairs. John will ask his son Brian to look at it.

Tom will schedule a time for the Fire Marshall to check the fire extinguishers and will call Churchville Electric to install emergency lights and to do regular maintenance on the generator.

One of the sump pumps in the basement stopped working; Tom will replace it.

The urinal trap needs to be replaced.

The next meeting will be December 17th after church.
